
INDIGENOUS PEOPLE PROTECT 80% OF BIODIVERSITY, FACING HIGH RISKS FROM MINING, OIL, AGRIBUSINESS, AND PALM OIL.

40% 5% INDIGENOUS GROUPS REPRESENT 5% OF THE POPULATION BUT MAKE UP 40% OF ENVIRONMENTAL DEFENDERS KILLED (GLOBAL WITNESS, 2020).





KILLINGS ARE LINKED TO MINING; IN LATIN AMERICA, 50% OF THESE CRIMES ARE MINING-RELATED.

# Why a YOUTH-WED coalition is needed

By 2030, the youth population aged 15-24 will reach 1.3 billion globally (United Nations). Youth are already actively advocating for environmental and human rights and have pushed governments for policy changes. A coalition between youth and Women Environmental Defenders (WED) can amplify these efforts, creating stronger, genderinclusive strategies against environmental crimes.

# First steps to building the coalition:

• Identify existing youth groups and understand their origins.



- Evaluate their agendas and alignment with environmental protection goals.
- Promote gender inclusivity by assessing if women are fairly represented, and, if not, explore ways to increase their participation.

Following these steps, the next phase is to gain a deeper understanding of WED's experiences, challenges, and the unique threats they face.

# Key Actions

#### Better understanding of environmental crimes



### Objective:

Build youth understanding of local environmental crimes through the guidance of Women Environmental Defenders (WED)

- Learning from WED: Youth learn directly from WED about threats to land and culture, such as displacement from hydro projects, and are informed about legal rights and protections.
- Interactive knowledge transfer: WED engage youth through storytelling, drama, and role-play, fostering deeper awareness and encouraging action.



 Developing campaigns: Using insights from WED, youth create digital and social campaigns, press releases, and speak at global forums.



#### Outcome:

Increased understanding of environmental issues, a sense of ownership, and youthdriven campaigns for awareness and advocacy

# Collect community data

### Objective:

Strengthen youth groups to collect valuable data from local households on issues like gender-based violence linked to wildlife crime

- Door-to-Door Surveys: Youth engage directly with community members, gathering data that provides new insights into local challenges.
- Focused Questions: Surveys address specific issues, such as connections between gender-based violence and environmental crime.





#### Outcome:

Actionable data that supports policy changes and informs media and stakeholders.

#### Integrate awareness into schools



Encourage shifts in school curriculums to include local environmental issues, fostering informed decision-making in future generations.

- Curriculum Assessment: Youth, guided by WED, assess if and how environmental crimes are discussed in schools.
- Engagement and Strategy: Through school clubs and peer interactions, youth identify knowledge gaps and strategize ways to raise awareness.





#### Outcome:

Increased awareness among students, with proposed curriculum changes submitted to authorities
